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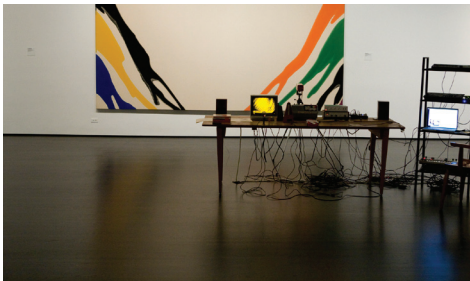

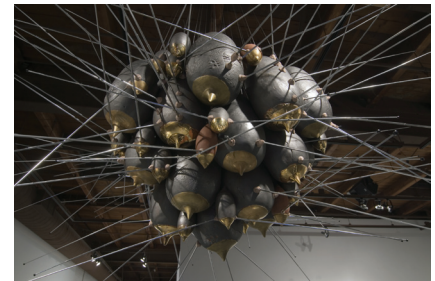

NEW YORK, NY, September 29, 2010—The Studio Museum in Harlem is proud to announce the new 2010-11 artists in residence, who begin their residence today: **Simone Leigh, Kamau Amu Patton** and **Paul Mpagi Sepuya**. Since its founding in 1968, the Studio Museum has held a strong commitment to nurturing and advancing the work of visual artists of African descent. The *Artist-in-Residence* program was conceived at the time of the Museum's opening and has been a widely renowned practical application of this commitment. The program has supported nearly 100 graduates who have gone on to highly regarded careers.

Every year, the Museum offers a twelve-month studio residency for three emerging artists. Each artist is granted a free non-living studio space, a \$20,000 fellowship, and a \$1,000 materials stipend. The program is designed to serve emerging artists of African and Latino descent locally, nationally and internationally, working across all media. At the end of the residency, an exhibition of the artists' work will be presented in the Museum's galleries.

Hours and Admission

The Studio Museum is open Thursday and Friday, noon-9pm; Saturday, 10am-6pm; Sunday, noon-6pm. The Museum is closed to the public on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Museum admission is by suggested donation: \$7 for adults, \$3 for students (with valid I.D.) and seniors. Free for children 12 and under. Sundays are free at the Studio Museum, thanks to generous support from Target.
